Krista Koehl Scholarship

Eligibility

This scholarship will be applied to tuition during the fall and spring terms of the 2018-19 academic year. The recipient must be enrolled and attending Lewis & Clark Law School during the fall and spring terms of the 2018-19 academic year to receive this scholarship.

<u>Amount</u>

\$4,040 will be awarded to one or more recipients in various amounts at the discretion of the committee. In addition to the scholarship, the selected student will be introduced to members of the Women in Environmental Law organization, to which Krista Koehl belonged and was an active member.

Criteria

The Krista Koehl Scholarship recognizes women law students in their second, third, or fourth year of law school either in the day or evening division. The recipient must:

- Be a female law student with a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.4.
- Demonstrate financial need.
- Demonstrate intent to obtain a Certificate in Environmental and Natural Resources Law.
- Demonstrate a commitment to the law school or larger community through service to the law school, engagement in law school activities, and or charitable activities.
- Demonstrate a sense of balance between law school scholarship, her fellow students, and her personal life.

Specific Statement

Submit a specific statement that addresses how you meet the criteria stated above. Note: While the Krista Koehl Selection Committee will receive a copy of the financial information you submit on the Scholarship Applicant Information Form (SAIF), we suggest you also include a narrative demonstrating your financial need in your specific statement.

Scholarship Recipient Responsibilities

- Write an acknowledgement letter to the Krista Koehl Scholarship donors and selection committee. This scholarship will only be applied to tuition once an acknowledgement letter has been received.
- Agree to provide an update on academic career and/or post-graduation accomplishments when requested by the Law School Development Office.
