This book is a source of arguments and practical suggestions for changing the American arbitration process. First published in 2006, it argues that the Federal Arbitration Act badly needs major change. The book contains draft legislation for use in international and domestic arbitration and a detailed explanation of the precise justifications for proposed legislative changes. It also contains two proposals that might be deemed radical – to ban arbitration related to the purchase of products by consumers and to prohibit arbitration of employment disputes. Each proposal is fully vetted and critiqued by one or more of the other co-authors.
