# Prof. Dan Rohlf's Musings from Croatia: THE ENVIRONMENTAL & SOCIAL IMPACTS OF TOURISM

I'm on sabbatical for the 2021-22 school year (delayed a year by covid), and my wife and I are spending quite a bit of time abroad, both traveling as well as staying in one place while I'm either working on scholarship or teaching in Italy as part of my Fulbright grant at the University of Trento. I find that travel always provides me with

valuable new perspectives – I guess that's part of the theory behind sabbaticals – and this summer and fall I've been thinking a lot about the environmental and social impacts of tourism.

Outdoor recreation and domestic tourism in general have exploded in the United States. While getaways relieve covid-induced isolation and jumpstart tourist-dependent economies, this surge of tourists has a variety of consequences including unprecedented crowds on trails and in parks; trampling, trash, and other waste in all corners of public lands; and housing converted to more lucrative short-term rentals. International travel is beginning to rebound as well, focusing acute impacts on particularly renowned sites. Cruise ships send thousands of people at a time through places like Venice and Santorini, while local residents increasingly abandon these areas as prices soar and housing is converted to accommodate visitors. Tour guides in both Split and Dubrovnik told me that average Croatians simply can no longer afford to live in the central parts of those cities. Indeed, while I found the physical setting and architecture of Dubrovnik simply stunning, the entire walled city had the feel of a museum with upscale restaurants and gift shops. ## PROTECTING THE OKAVANGO RIVER BASIN: An update from Professor Erica Lyman

Lewis & Clark Law's Global Law Alliance for Animals and the Environment (GLA) has expanded its climate change work to fight for climate justice on behalf of people, wildlife, and the environment generally. GLA's latest work supports the efforts to put an end to the



oil and gas exploration threatening the Okavango Delta. The Okavango Delta is among the world's crown jewels, a World Heritage site, an Ramsar Wetland of International Importance, and an ecological wonder, home to indigenous peoples sustaining their way of life and some of the most important populations of wild animals, including African elephants. Oil and gas development in the region puts this all at risk.

GLA and our tireless law student advocates have been working directly with local stakeholders and other international organizations to ensure justice for the people and wildlife of the Delta region using creative legal strategies that push the boundaries of what it means to practice international environmental law but that recognize that creative, strategic, impact lawyering is necessary in the face of a highly capitalized, well-connected, and entrenched fossil fuel industry.

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The law is increasingly starting to grapple with these issues. Local governments are exploring ways to moderate its impacts with regulations such as limits on short term rentals, while land managers try tools such as permit-based access restrictions. Such efforts are both challenging and controversial, and require balancing between property rights and community benefits, resource protection and visitor access. Easy answers are few and far
