FARMED ANIMAL PROTECTION PROJECT

The Farmed Animal Protection Project provides an exciting opportunity for our increasingly diverse student body (LLM, MSL and JD) to protect farmed animals. With faculty guidance, students turn their passion into action through individual projects that are shared with the public at the end of the academic year. Our student advocates are having a major impact for farmed animals, both terrestrial and aquatic, by:

- critically evaluating farmed animal protection strategies;
- creating public awareness campaigns;
- drafting model laws;
- and developing approaches to repairing our broken food system.



INDUSTRIAL ANIMAL AGRICULTURE LAW

Industrialized animal agriculture, also called concentrated animal feeding operations (CAFOs), has extensive impacts on animals, humans and the environment. This course examines:

- the legal framework underlying the industrialized use of animals for food;
- the conditions in which farmed animals are raised, transported, and slaughtered;
- U.S. federal and state laws and policies that impact farmed animal welfare and comparative international examples;
- how CAFOs impact the environment, communities in which CAFOs are built, workers, food safety, and public health.



FOOD LAW AND MORE

Our courses routinely focus on legal issues and advocacy on behalf of farmed animals. A few examples:

- Our **Food Law** course introduces students to modern day food law issues in the United States and abroad and its impact on animals, the environment, and public health.
- Our **Animal Law Legislation & Lobbying** course focuses on creating, community organizing, and lobbying for the passage of laws that benefit animals, including practicing lobbying techniques.
- Our **Aquatic Animal Law** course provides an overview of the ways in which the law addresses (or fails to address) aquatic animals, including a focus on aquatic animal sentience and contemporary issues in aquatic animal law such as octopus farming and the general growth of aquaculture.



MAKING A DIFFERENCE for Farmed Animals



Bianka Atlas ('20, LLM, New Zealand) helped lead a campaign with SAFE (Save

Animals From Exploitation) in New Zealand to end live export, a horrific practice in which animals are crowded onto ships and cruelly transported by sea for days to weeks at a time.



Alice Di Concetto ('16, LLM, France) founded the European

Institute for Animal Law and Policy and is part of a collaboration in the E.U. to ban the culling of male chicks in the egg-laying industry.



Yvonne Gurira ('22, LLM, Zimbabwe) founded Animal Advocates International where

she is doing innovative work to reduce the use of battery cages for hens and teaching Zimbabweans about problems with industrialized animal farming.



Cynthia von Schlichten ('23, LLM, U.S.) is General Counsel for Farmed Sanctuary and

is helping the organization achieve its mission of pursuing bold solutions to help farmed animals. She also teaches Nonprofit Law in our online advanced degree program.
