Program Design:

Study will focus on a broad interdisciplinary introduction to the history, language, culture and politics of this Southeast Asian country. During the first and longest component, the program will be located in Ho Chi Minh City where students will be immersed in extensive language study and introductory course work. Seven to ten days will be spent in the central region, the ancient capital and historical center of Vietnam. A final segment of the program will be offered in Hanoi, the contemporary seat of the government. Weekend and day trips will supplement and enrich each course.

Requirements Fulfilled:

IS 240 and 241 fulfill the 8-credit International Studies general education requirement.

Credits:

4 courses per semester/16 credits 7/25/08

Curriculum: FL 101: Beginning Vietnamese (4 credits):

A streamlined and focused course designed to produce maximum functional fluency in a short time period. Course topics and vocabulary provide students with the language patterns needed to successfully immerse themselves in everyday situations while living and studying in Vietnam. Assists students in achieving a solid foundation in conversational and written Vietnamese.

IS 240 Modern Vietnamese History (4 credits):

Covers the periods of Vietnamese history from 1802 to the present. Course focuses primarily on the past two centuries of Vietnamese history: the establishment of the country's last dynasty, French colonial conquest and domination, the introduction of Marxism-Leninism, the struggle and recovery of independence in 1945, the war of resistance against France (the Indochina War) and the war of resistance against the United States (the Vietnam War).

IS 241 Vietnamese Society Today (4 credits):

Explores contemporary Vietnamese society and culture from both inside and outside perspectives, with an emphasis on the changes since the end of the American War (1975) and the beginning of economic reforms (1986). Classes held in a participatory seminar style, with weekly readings and discussions plus guest speakers and field trips.

IS 242 Environmental Sustainability in Viet Nam: Problems and Solutions (4 credits):

The staggering growth in Vietnam has and continues to produce considerable negative impacts on Viet Nam's environmental systems, some of which suffered even before reforms reinvigorated the economy. This course will survey some of the major environmental problems Viet Nam is currently facing in both urban and rural contexts. Through lectures and fieldtrips. students will talk with experts on particular issues and experience everyday problems directly. Current strategies and possible solutions to various concerns will also be explored. Topics will include: urbanization / population resettlement, sustainable farming, biodiversity, waste management, air and water pollution, wildlife

conservation, and legacies of the war.

Program Comments:

Vietnam has entered the 21st century as one of the most politically and economically dynamic countries of Asia.

Through immersion in contemporary Vietnamese society, students will have the opportunity to do in-

depth research into the many factors that are influencing the transition from a closed post-war society to one that is currently striving to integrate more fully into the international community. This program of study will provide unparalleled opportunities to learn in a nation that is experiencing significant economic liberalization and rapid development blended with its traditional roots and a strong cultural heritage.
